

2021 Young Adult Leadership Council (YALC)

Texas Network of Youth Services (TNOYS) is accepting applications for our 2021 Young Adult Leadership Council (YALC). The YALC is a paid leadership development program for young adults ages 16 to 25 with lived experiences such as foster care, juvenile justice system involvement, homelessness, etc.

Since the YALC was first created in 2018, the YALC has prioritized youth-adult partnership such as the "<u>Youth in Action Day</u>." The YALC has undergone recent changes to include a more engaging and all-inclusive leadership curriculum. The YALC will train its members to influence decisions about the services that youth and young adults receive, and how to lead discussions/trainings.

The YALC will follow TNOYS' comprehensive systems change approach by working closely with Policy, Practice, and Partnership. YALC members will also be trained in TNOYS' seven issue areas: Housing and Homelessness Services, Child Welfare, Justice, Education, Workforce, Health and Behavioral Health, and Victim and Survivor Services.

Application deadline is December 13th, 2020, at midnight CT. Interviews will be done as applications are received. Applicants will be notified of their application status on December 23rd, 2020.

Program Overview

Orientation will be held on **January 8th and 9th**. YALC members will attend weekly virtual meetings starting the week of January 11th, 2020. YALC members will work 10 hours each week. This program will run for nine months. During this time period YALC members can expect to be involved in projects such as the 87th Texas legislative session, TNOYS' Annual Conference, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services' Preparation for Adult Living (PAL) program, among other projects.

In a typical week, YALC members can expect to dedicate four hours to a training meeting in which they will receive training to improve and/or gain new skills, review policy proposals, conduct research, learn community organizing skills, among other topics. For the remaining six hours, YALC members will be expected to complete assignments given for the week. This can include, but is not limited to, conducting research, collecting stories from their peers, writing blogs, taking part in campaigns aimed at helping system-involved youth and young adults, testifying at the state legislature, speaking at policy events, providing feedback on TNOYS' programming and product development, co-hosting trainings to youth service organizations, and participating in other communication campaigns such as Twitter town halls.

Compensation

YALC members will be paid **\$15.00 per hour** for training and group work throughout the course of the program.

Qualifications

- Must be between the ages of 16 to 25.
- Must be able to work independently and in a team environment.
- Must be willing to learn and/or further develop their skills.
- Must show willingness to learn new skills around policy advocacy, storytelling campaigns, and community organizing.
