

Washington Handbook / Housing and Contracts / Couch-surfing / I am staying at a friend's house for free and he is kicking me out. Can he do that?

I am staying at a friend's house for free and he is kicking me out. Can he do that?

Yes. Your friend's past generosity does not mean he has to house you indefinitely. You have not made a contractual agreement with the property owner or tenant, so your right to live at the house is subject to your friend's whims. You must leave if he is kicking you out.

Moreover, if your friend is renting, he has a separate agreement with the landlord. Your friend's landlord could have rules restricting guests' length of stay. Without signing the lease yourself, you may subject your friend to an additional fee, or worse, cause your friend to violate the terms of the lease. Or if your friend receives Section 8 or other housing assistance, they could lose their benefits if you stay more than a certain amount of time.

	Emancipation
Other Information	Emancipation means that a minor has the same legal rights and obligations as an 18-year-old (or older) adult. Emancipation could be expected to occur (1) by reaching the age of 18, (2) by lawful marriage, or (3) by court order. There is no standard law or procedure allowing for emancipation in Minnesota. If you have a current CHIPS case, your attorney can make the request that you live independently at age 16,
About the Handbook	with approval from the county board. If you have a case in front of a judge on a different matter, your
	attorney can then ask the court to emancipate you pursuant to case law, but this rarely happens in
Disclaimer	Minnesota. If you have no current court case, you can't go to court and ask that a judge declare you emancipated.
