Laura Hughes | Keynote Speaker

He is also the recipient of numerous awards and recognitions, notably the 2018 Juvenile Law Center Leadership Prize.

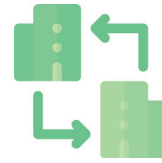

This year's conference offers a range of programming for youth and young adult (YYA) attendees! On Wednesday, June 10, we strongly encourage YYA ages 15 - 26 to take advantage of and attend the youth-only Orientation + Storytelling workshop. Youth-only programming continues on Thursday, June 11, with Youth Track workshops (see pages 15 and 17 for more details). On Friday, June 12, workshops are open to both professionals and youth to learn from and alongside one another. A limited number of workshops are only appropriate for professionals and are labeled accordingly.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

TNOYS provides continuing education credit hours for professionals. Conference attendees are eligible to earn up to 16 CEU hours throughout the 2.5-day in-person conference programming. Attendees are eligible to earn 4 additional CEU hours for participating in Pre-Conference Institutes. TNOYS is an approved CEU provider for Licensed Social Workers (LSW), Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC), Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFT), and Continuing Professional Education Providers (CPE). The majority of sessions are typically approved for Juvenile Probation Officers (JPO), Juvenile Supervision Officers (JSO), and Community Activities Officers (CAO) by the Texas Juvenile Justice Department. The majority of sessions are also typically approved for Licensed Child Care Administrator (LCCA), Licensed Child Placing Agency Administrators (LCPAA) and for the following substance abuse professional licenses: LCDCs, Associate Prevention Specialists (APS), Certified Prevention Specialists (CPS), and Peer Mentor/Peer Recovery Designation (PM/PRC).

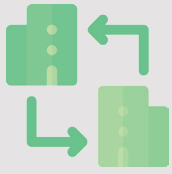

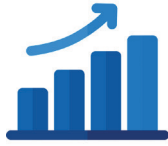

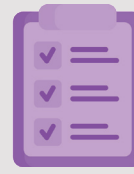

Motivational Interviewing Basics: Building Skills for Effective Change Conversations

9:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. - CONCHO

This session provides a foundational overview of Motivational Interviewing (MI), an evidence-based approach widely used across youth services. Participants will be introduced to the core principles of MI, including partnership, evocation, and autonomy support, as well as essential communication skills such as open questions, affirmations, reflections, and summaries. This institute emphasizes practical application and skill development, helping participants recognize change talk, respond effectively to ambivalence, and avoid common conversational traps. This session is ideal for practitioners, supervisors, and leaders new to MI or seeking a refresher on the fundamentals.

Experiential Strategies for Addressing Trauma and Grief

This highly experiential and skills-driven training blends foundational lessons from developmental trauma theory and grief work with the practice of play-informed interventions. Participants will explore how developmental trauma and loss shape internal experience, attachment, self-concept, behavior, and relational capacity across the lifespan, from early childhood through adolescence and young adulthood. Using a variety of interactive methods, including sandtray, expressive arts, metaphor work, movement, and structured experiential exercises, participants will develop a toolbox of intervention skills designed to help clients externalize, explore, and integrate difficult experiences.

Building Alliances to Prevent and Address Children Without Placement (DFPS Personnel Only)

In this interactive training, participants will discuss their more challenging experiences working with youth and explore the bases for difficult behaviors and situations such as refusing or running away from placements, disengagement, and conflict. Participants will gain insight into the critical roles of trust and transparency, humility and responsiveness, authentic relationship-building, and youth voice. Through dialogue, first-hand reflections from youth, and scenario activities, participants will strengthen their framework for addressing and mitigating challenges and add tools to their strategic repertoire.

Drawing on lessons from her work alongside homeless and runaway youth, participants will reflect on the stories shaping their work and explore how lived experience, research, and storytelling can shift understanding and open pathways to a joyful, irresistible future.

Cross-System Approaches to Foster Youth Success

Connecting Youth to the Path of Success

This session explores capacity-building and strategic partnerships between Texas Workforce Solutions (TWS) Vocational Rehabilitation Services, education systems, state and local agencies, and business and community stakeholders. Attendees will learn about Youth Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) programs and strategic collaborations that promote disability awareness, vocational rehabilitation services, and pre-employment transition services for students with disabilities.

From Silos to Systems: Practical Cross-Sector Strategies That Strengthen Youth Outcomes

Youth routinely navigate multiple systems such as CPS, schools, mental health services, and juvenile justice. However, these systems often do not communicate with each other effectively. This workshop provides practical, Texas-specific tools for cross-system collaboration that improve safety, reduce duplication, and strengthen outcomes for youth and families.



The Importance of Natural Supports in Reducing the Housing Instability of LGBTQ Youth

Texas LGBTQ+ youth experience higher rates of housing instability and homelessness than their peers. This presentation highlights the Family Housing and Me (FHAM) Project, a landmark longitudinal study of LGBTQ+ youth in South Texas. Presenters will uncover important findings from the study, such as how LGBTQ+ youth managed housing instability by leaning on their natural supports, particularly non-parental relatives like aunts and grandmothers.



Safe Spaces, Safe Kids: Building Protective Environments Against CSEC

This informative workshop equips youth-serving professionals with practical skills to recognize the warning signs of Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) and implement protective strategies in schools. 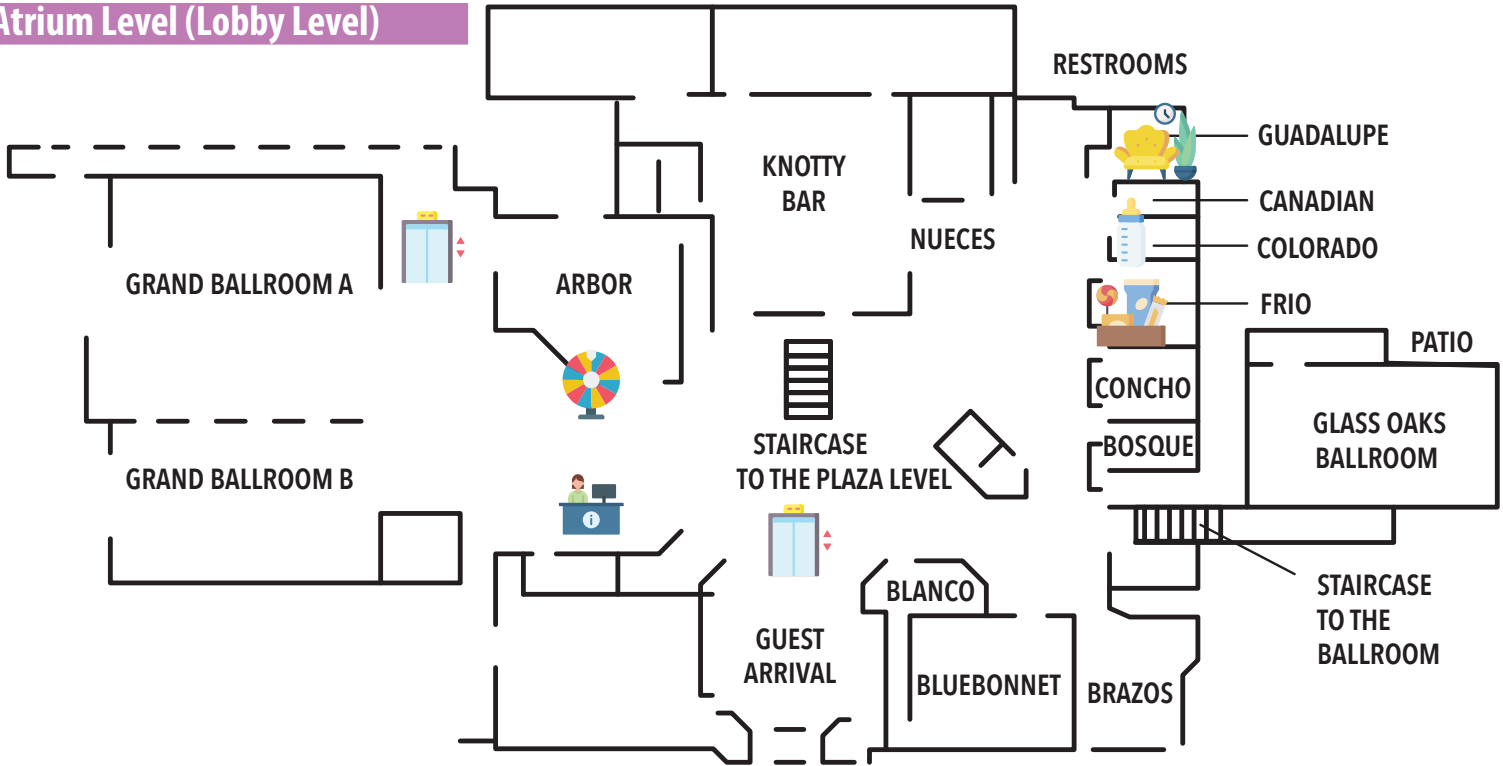
