Gabe Salazar

Motivational Speaker

Motivational Youth Speaker Gabe Salazar overcame poverty, gang influence, and homelessness to become a successful entrepreneur. He has inspired teens, families, teachers, and school administrators with a message of hope and dreaming big for over 15 years.

After being mentored by his high school principal in South Texas, Gabe was rescued from gang influence and became the first in his family to attend college. Gabe graduated from Southwestern Assemblies of God University in Waxahachie, Texas. He began his career as an inclusion specialist for special education and behavioral students at an intermediate school in San Antonio, where he discovered his unique talent for speaking to teens and families. Today, Gabe is a professional speaker traveling all over the world to schools, teen conferences, churches, and camps.

Gabe has spoken to millions of teens throughout his career, including national tours for Boys and Girls Clubs of America, Taco Bell Foundation for Teens, U.S. Air Force Family Services, and Ford Salute to Education. *Popular Hispanics* Magazine recognizes him as America's #1 Latino Youth Speaker.



Renée Wilson-Simmons

Founder, Healing Trauma, Reclaiming Joy

Renée Wilson-Simmons, DrPH, is the founder of Healing Trauma, Reclaiming Joy, a firm that helps clients understand the life-long impact of childhood adversity and trauma on the health, safety, and well-being of children, their families, and their communities. Renée is a sought-after and engaging speaker on such issues as resilience and healing, ambiguous loss, and supporting youth through trauma-informed care.

Renée is the former executive director of the ACE (Adverse Childhood Experience) Awareness Foundation in Memphis, Tennessee, an organization that supports and develops innovative strategies to prevent trauma and toxic stress, decrease mental health stigmas, and advance prevention efforts and racial justice. She also implemented *Parenting in the Pandemic: Tools for Surviving and Thriving*, a series of interactive online sessions that garnered over 5,000 views and promoted good mental health and family bonding.

Previously, Renée served for six years as director of the National Center for Children in Poverty (NCCP), a nonpartisan public policy research center at Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. She has also led initiatives to improve child and adolescent outcomes at Evidence2Success and with Plain Talk / Hablando Claro, which increases access to age-appropriate reproductive health services and resources.

Renée earned a doctorate in public health, with a concentration in maternal and child health, from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

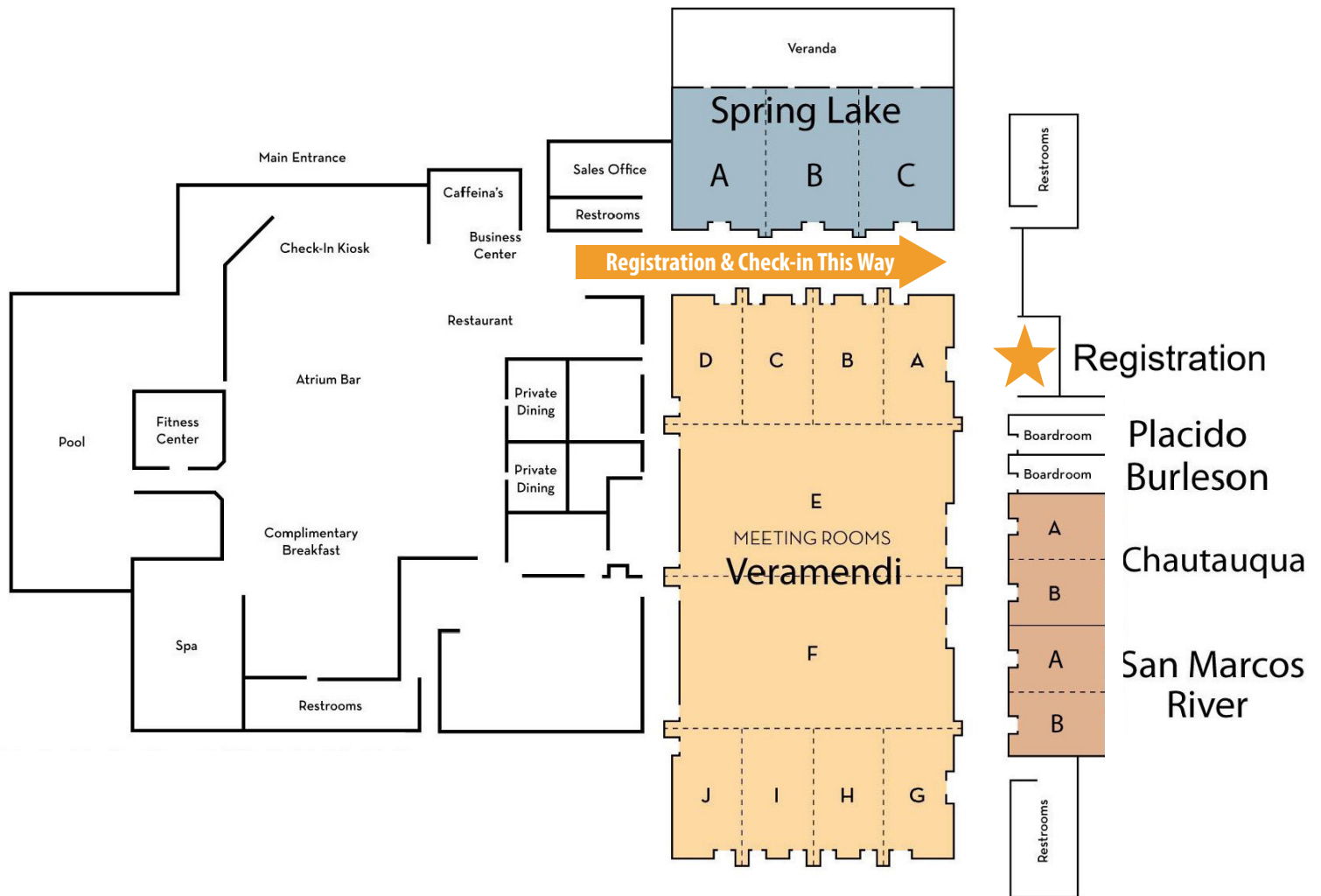

Hotel & Conference Center FLOOR MAP



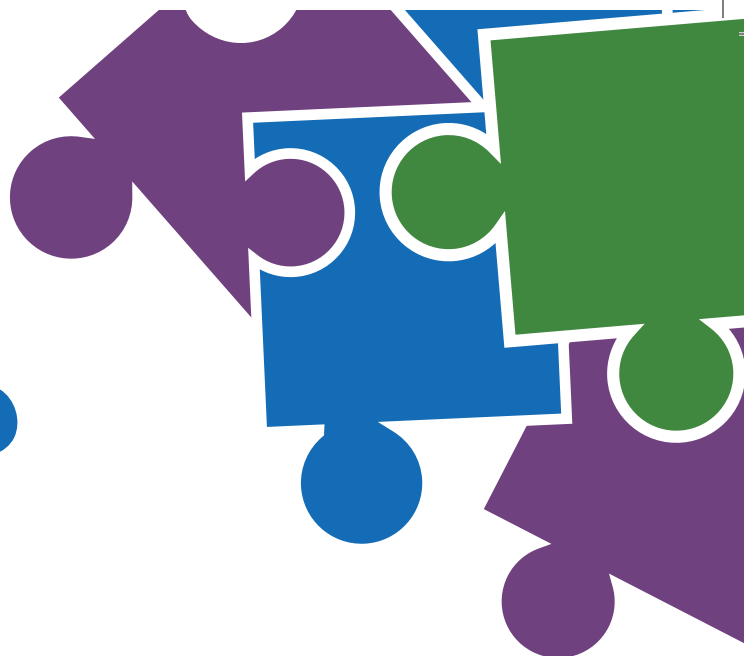
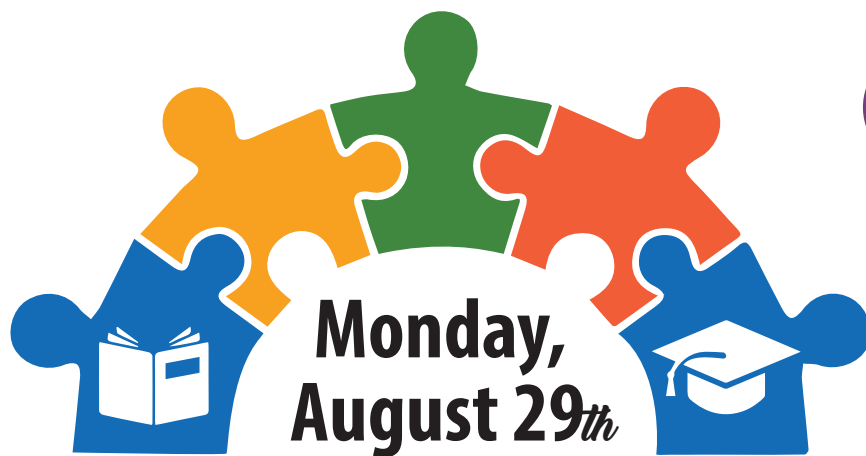
FOOD & BEVERAGES DURING THE TEHCY SUMMIT

McKinney-Vento 101

Are you new to working with students and families experiencing homelessness? During this session, TEA Texas Education for Homeless Children and Youth (TEHCY) Program staff will discuss the key requirements of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Attendees will learn more about identification, enrollment, dispute resolution, and the roles and responsibilities of local education agencies (LEAs) and McKinney-Vento liaisons to support students experiencing homelessness. TECHY Program resources and sample forms will be provided.



Strategies to Re-Engage Opportunity Youth in Education and Workforce Across Texas

Texas is home to an estimated 500,000 opportunity youth (OY), young people ages 16-24 who are not in school, not in work or are under-employed, and not in any postsecondary education or training. Many of these teenagers and young adults have experienced homelessness, and over the past 2 years, COVID-19 has led to greater and greater disconnection. Join this session to learn about, and get involved in, TNOYS' work with the Texas Opportunity Youth Network to re-engage young people and connect them to education and careers that fuel their goals. Learn about strategies to scale reconnection, pathways that strengthen education outcomes for OY, community partnerships that leverage a community's unique strengths, and solutions for school and employer accommodations for OY and those with lived experiences of homelessness.



Serving Migratory Students Facing Homelessness

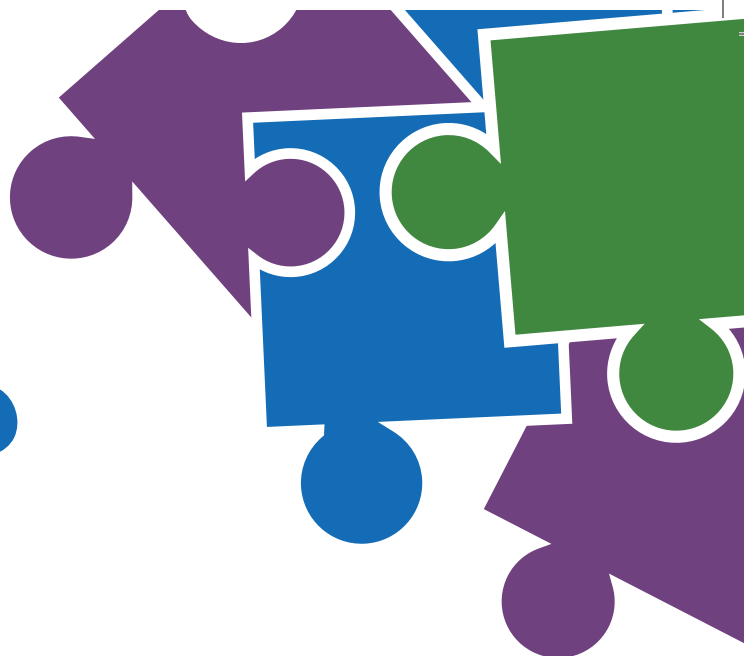
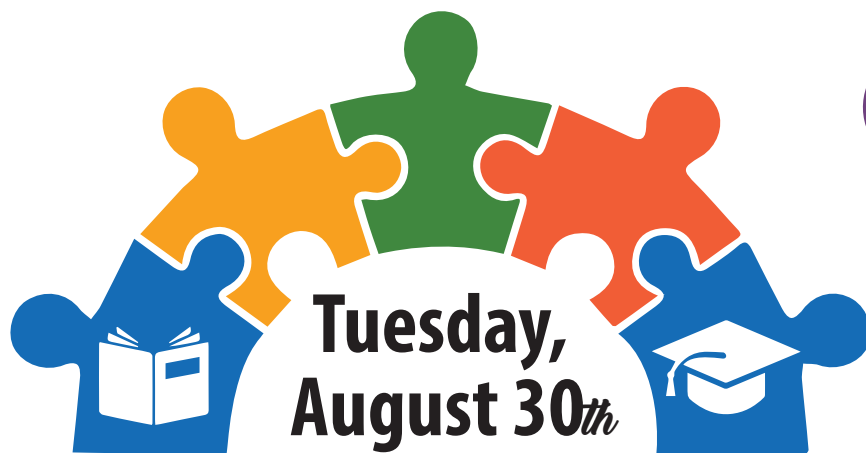

Strong at the Broken Places: The Power to Heal from the Trauma of Homelessness VERAMENDI E/F

Resilience is a trait that many believe one is either born with or will never possess. Renée Wilson-Simmons will contest that opinion and assert that we all can become resilient by building upon existing strengths and learning and applying new tools for coping. To support the critical role that education professionals and youth-serving providers can play in resilience building, this keynote will focus on the types of trauma; the impact of trauma and toxic stress on healthy development, especially among children and families who have experienced homelessness; the importance of trauma-informed care; and the need for those charged with supporting young people and their families to invest in their own emotional health.

McKinney-Vento Discipline

Meeting Youth Where They Are: Exploring Innovative Approaches to Supporting Youth Post COVID-19

Research finds that high school students experiencing homelessness are 4.39 times more likely to attempt suicide than their housing secure peers. Though we do not yet fully understand the impact COVID-19 has had on students, we do know that more students than ever need housing and counseling resources. In this session, youth-serving professionals from across the Dallas Metroplex will explore creative solutions to support young people from trauma-informed and strengths-focused lenses.



Supporting Homeless Students and Parents in a Title I, Part A Program

Trauma Sensitive School Framework

Building a Bridge from the Fringe to the Heart: A Collaborative Model to Prevent and Address Human Trafficking

Darrin Cox will present on how Abilene ISD has raised awareness of the student homeless population, a group that is particularly vulnerable to human trafficking. Participants will learn how Abilene ISD created community collaborations, increased access to services, and expanded funding and resources to meet students' basic needs. They will also learn about different facets of human trafficking and how to identify the signs of potential victimization when working with students.



ID Documents, Driver's Education, and Licenses for Youth Experiencing Homelessness

Navigating society without identification is extremely challenging. However, the processes to obtain these documents are complex, and many youth and young adults experiencing homelessness enter adulthood without them. This presentation will cover the basics of how to obtain a birth certificate, social security card, Texas ID card, and driver's license, how education professionals can help youth and families access these documents and resources, as well as common barriers and tips to overcome them.



In Their Own Words: The Importance of Normalcy for Transition-Age Youth Experiencing Homelessness

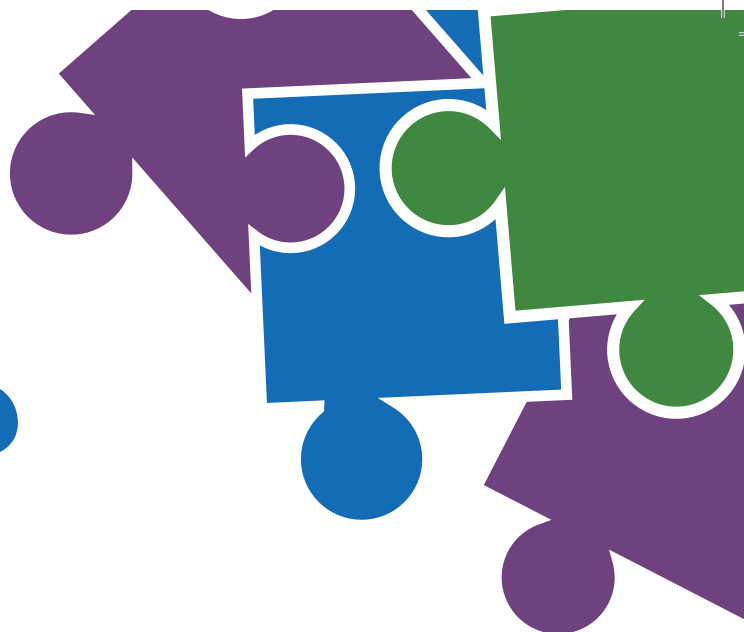
