# FEATURED SPEAKERS AND PERFORMERS



Jama Shelton (they/them) | Keynote Speaker

Jama Shelton is an Associate Professor at the Silberman School of Social Work at Hunter College and the Associate Director of the Silberman Center for Sexuality and Gender. Dr. Shelton's program of research focuses on cisgenderism in social services and social work education, as well as LGBTQ+ youth homelessness and structural inequity. Having worked for years as a direct service provider with unstably housed LGBTQ+ youth, Dr. Shelton prefers to work on participatory projects with young people directly impacted by housing instability and houselessness. Most recently, they contributed to a participatory research project in collaboration with True Colors United.



Michael Guinn (he/him) | Performer

Michael Guinn is a published poet, actor, event host, and advocate for social justice who has performed all over the US and Canada. As a dynamic speaker and poet, Michael specializes in high energy performance poetry and creative crowd engagement. His work focuses on healing and finding independence via poems and stories that are appropriate for all audiences. Michael believes that everyone should share their voice.



Ellisa Brown (she/her) | Performer

Ellisa Brown is a Texas native, author, poet, and innate storyteller. Fond of wordplay, extraneous commas, and adventures, she graduated from The Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland, and Sciences Po in Paris, France. Ellisa spins tales and poems featuring both the mundane and extraordinary, but always warps the lens or shifts the perspective.



Jose Alfaro (he/him) | Keynote Speaker

Jose is a consultant and lived experience expert on domestic child sex trafficking, as well as a public speaker, author, advocate, and activist. He is a board member of The Human Trafficking Legal Center (HEAL), and has worked with several anti-trafficking organizations around the globe to spread awareness on trafficking, specifically within the LGBTQ+ community and as this issue relates to males. He has been featured in several publications and has worked with law enforcement, DHS, and the DOJ to name a few.



Christopher "Yungchris" Thomas (he/him) | Keynote Speaker

Christopher Thomas has visited 24 countries around the world as a dance teacher, choreographer, and performer. Thomas spent a year in Bangkok, Thailand training local pop stars and performing at events throughout Southeast Asia before he moved back to Houston in 2011 to start his own dance company, Sonkiss'd Dance Theater. Thomas' students have gone on to work and tour with major artists, including Taylor Swift and Beyoncé.





# CONTINUING EDUCATION

TNOYS provides continuing education credit hours for professionals. Conference attendees are eligible to earn up to 14 CEU hours throughout the 2.5-day in-person conference. Attendees are eligible to earn 4-6 additional CEU hours for participating in pre-conference institutes, and another 5+ CEU hours for participating in the virtual conference day. TNOYS is an approved CEU provider for Licensed Social Workers (LSW), Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC), Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFT), and Continuing Professional Education Providers (CPE). This conference is approved for Juvenile Probation Officers (JPO), Juvenile Supervision Officers (JSO), and Community Activities Officers (CAO) by the Texas Juvenile Justice Department. This conference is also approved for Licensed Child Care Administrator (LCCA) and Licensed Child Placing Agency Administrators (LCPAA) licenses. The majority of sessions are also approved for CEUs for the following substance abuse professional licenses: LCDCs, Associate Prevention Specialists (APS), Certified Prevention Specialists (CPS), and Peer Mentor/Peer Recovery Coach Designation (PM/PRC) through our partnership with Connections Individual and Family Services.

#### Commercial Sexual Exploitation-Identification Tool (CSE-IT) User Training

The CSE-IT is a research-based screening tool that helps improve early identification of commercially sexually exploited youth (CSEY). The tool is appropriate for use by any provider serving youth, including child welfare workers, probation officers, mental health clinicians, and first responders. In Texas, CSE-IT is integrated within Lighthouse, an innovative software platform that enables users to complete screenings online and access and analyze CSE-IT data at any time. In this training, participants will become certified CSE-IT users and learn next steps to access and use the Lighthouse platform. \*Please note that this training does not meet the requirements for DFPS personnel.

This workshop will detail the issue of adolescent addiction and best practices for engaging teenagers in treatment and recovery. Funding has heavily influenced who we deem as the target population in youth-serving organizations. This influence can cause systems to overlook youth who need low to moderate intervention to prevent them from experiencing foster care or homelessness. This workshop will explore cost-effective strategies to service youth who are in the margins of the target population.



#### **Dare to Lead**

This workshop will address how to re-energize the workplace by tapping into the talents and strengths of staff, board members, and community partners. Attendees will also discuss working with youth to build a successful youth advisory board that broadens your audience, captures attention, and taps into our youth's potential and talents.



#### Youth Homelessness and the Transition into Adulthood

This session presents findings from doctoral research in the UK of youth's experiences of homelessness, the transition to adulthood, and how social policy and developmental psychology can inform interventions at different life stages. Dr. Packer's presentation combines his research with his work funding nonprofits and leading The Cove's team, and highlights the importance of linking research concepts to solutions that meet young people's needs.



The Development and Implementation of a School-Community Guidance Center

This workshop explores how a school-community guidance center (SCGC) was created to better serve students at-risk of not finishing school as defined by the Texas Education Code. This SCGC model assists students while they attend their home campus with peers, in contrast to approaches that foster isolation or separation from school. Join to learn how schools and communities can work together to provide individual answers to school-wide problems.



Lobbying in the Lone Star State: How the Tax Code and State Law Affect Nonprofits When Lobbying for Lasting Change

True: Nonprofits can safely, legally, and effectively engage in local and state-level advocacy and lobbying work in Texas. But Texas nonprofits need to understand the rules that apply to their lobbying activities under state and federal law. This training is designed for all tax-exempt organizations doing state-level policy work in Texas. Participants will learn about relevant definitions, laws, and regulations, in order to make the most out of lobbying activities.



Managing Anti-Trafficking Teams

Survivors of human trafficking often face seemingly insurmountable barriers resulting from their exploitation. Due to these barriers, survivors need the support of a TEAM of individuals who can help them establish a new foundation and learn to thrive. This session will provide an overview of the unique needs of human trafficking survivors and demonstrate evidence-based and trauma-informed methods for utilizing teamwork approaches to care for survivors.

Increasing Access to Transition Services for Students with Disabilities with Jasmine Hernandez and Elzie Martinez, Workforce Solutions

Did you know that one in four individuals have a disability? In this session, attendees will gain perspective into how "disability" is defined and the variety of disabilities. Student HireAbility navigators will provide an overview of Workforce Solutions resources and transition services available to support students with disabilities. Attendees will also learn about Texas Workforce Solutions-Vocational Rehabilitation Services and how to connect with them.

Achieving Health Equity through Youth Engagement with David Auzenne, Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute and Hackett Center for Mental Health; and Marcy Melvin, Hackett Center for Mental Health

In this session participants will gain an operational understanding of health equity. Presenters will highlight current health inequities for today's youth, discuss the importance and power of youth engagement, and demonstrate the ways in which stories and experiences can influence policy and current practice. Participants will learn strategies to engage youth in this process while preparing adults to support youth in this space.



#### Roar: Strategic Storytelling - Advocacy Strategies & Tactics

Policymakers should listen to our recommendations about how policies and systems should change. As people who work in the social service field or people with system experience, our recommendations can change systems so that fewer young people experience homelessness and more young people who experience homelessness are served appropriately and quickly. In this session, participants will learn ways of telling their stories safely and effectively to achieve an advocacy goal.



#### To New Heights: Building an Inclusive Brand

Oftentimes, organizations need their brand and marketing to resonate with a range of audiences across age, gender, race, ethnicity, and ability. This workshop will explore strategies to make an impact among diverse audiences, from youth clients to potential funders and partners. We'll discuss branding 101, inclusive marketing tactics, and best practices to amplify the voices of youth and young adults.



#### **Texas Opportunity Youth Network Innovation Fund Model**

Hannah Gourgey, Aspen Institute SALON 2

In 2021, the Aspen Institute's Opportunity Youth Forum launched the Texas Opportunity Youth Network (TOYN) to help communities build expertise and capacity to re-engage young adults who are not in school, work, or postsecondary education or training. Additionally, the TOYN Innovation Fund launched to assist programs that support opportunity youth (OY) with developing sustainable revenue models. This session shares preliminary lessons learned, allowing participants to discuss their experiences and strategies to develop blended funding models and consider barriers that inhibit access to public funding.



### Supporting Youth and Young Adults Experiencing Homelessness

ACENDing Over Obstacles: Developing an Impactful Program to Support McKinney-Vento Students with Julie Engelking and Melissa Soto, Brazosport Independent School District



In this workshop, presenters will share how Brazosport ISD used grant funding to create the ASCEND Program (Acquiring Strength, Character, Employability and Networking skills with Determination), adding additional support for secondary students facing homelessness. ASCEND students benefit by having caring and committed professionals providing mentoring, college and career readiness activities, and social emotional learning opportunities.

**Building Stability, Hope, and Connection for Youth Experiencing Homelessness** with Kimberly Bobbitt and Shaun Lee, The Cove - Heart of Texas

Since 2016, The Cove Heart of Texas, a Youth Homelessness Demonstration Project funded service, has supported high school aged youth experiencing homelessness. National and global attention to racial injustice has prompted many employers to strengthen their commitment to equity, yet racial and ethnic disparities are still impacting mental health in the workplace. In this workshop, participants will strengthen their understanding of how racial and ethnic identities intersect with mental health, as well as best practices to help young people of all backgrounds successfully enter the workforce and maintain their mental health while working.



#### **Understanding Risk Factors for LGBTQ+ Youth**

Tony's Place is a drop-in and resource center dedicated to LGBTQ+ youth up to 25 years old who are unhoused, unstably housed, or vulnerable to experiencing homelessness. LGBTQ+ youth are more likely to become unhoused or unstably housed than their straight peers as a result of specific barriers and risk factors faced by the LGBTQ+ community. This workshop will discuss common barriers and risk factors, how these barriers and risk factors can affect housing, employment, and health, and the importance of LGBTQ+ inclusive services.



#### Credible Messengers: Connecting with Youth Through Transformative Mentoring

Charles Rotramel and Carlos Hernandez, Houston reVision SALON 3

The Credible Messenger movement is an innovative approach to restorative justice that leverages the unique relationships that adults with lived experience of the justice system form with justice-involved youth. Credible Messengers connect with and motivate the most vulnerable young people to challenge and transform destructive thinking, attitudes, and actions, ultimately helping to modify behavior and strengthen disadvantaged communities. In this session, participants will receive an overview of the Credible Messenger movement and strategies to implement a Credible Messenger program.

Youth experiencing homelessness have greater involvement with the juvenile system than their peers. Conversely, youth may encounter homelessness because of a juvenile or criminal record. Additionally, we will highlight race, gender, or sex disparities present for youth who experience this intersection of systems.



# Meeting the Needs of Texas Youth Experiencing Commercial Sexual Exploitation: Research Preview

Homelessness and housing instability are primary risk factors for the commercial sexual exploitation of children and youth (CSEC/CSEY). TNOYS has been holding listening sessions with youth across Texas to inform development of such guidance.
