CONTINUING EDUCATION

TNOYS provides continuing education credit hours for professionals. Conference attendees are eligible to earn up to 14 CEU hours throughout the 2.5-day in-person conference. Attendees are eligible to earn 4-6 additional CEU hours for participating in pre-conference institutes, and another 5+ CEU hours for participating in the virtual conference day. TNOYS is an approved CEU provider for Licensed Social Workers (LSW), Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC), Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFT), and Continuing Professional Education Providers (CPE). The majority of sessions are typically approved for Juvenile Probation Officers (JPO), Juvenile Supervision Officers (JSO), and Community Activities Officers (CAO) by the Texas Juvenile Justice Department. The majority of sessions are also typically approved for Licensed Child Care Administrator (LCCA) and Licensed Child Placing Agency Administrators (LCPAA) licenses. This conference is also typically approved for CEUs for the following substance abuse professional licenses: LCDCs, Associate Prevention Specialists (APS), Certified Prevention Specialists (CPS), and Peer Mentor/Peer Recovery Coach Designation (PM/PRC) through our partnership with Connections Individual and Family Services.

Empowering Today's Youth to Combat Human Trafficking

In Their Own Words: The Importance of Normalcy for Transition-Age Youth with Lived Experience

This workshop will discuss the transition into adulthood including factors that increase the risk of youth systems involvement. After reviewing recent TNOYS efforts to listen to and learn from youth, participants will learn how they can develop more robust preventive strategies and interventions by centering the voices of transition-age youth. Participants will also discuss how normalcy is an important factor to foster resilience during this critical period.



Making Child Welfare Systems Inclusive Communities: Eliminating "Isms" that Promote Discriminatory Behavior & Exclusion

Disparity and disproportionality are wreaking havoc on our child welfare systems. This workshop will explore the role of implicit bias, microaggressions, and intersectionality in developing a solution to disparity and disproportionality. Within the session, participants will unpack conscious and unconscious ways that we discriminate, reflect on how they intersect with personal identity, and explore ways to counteract discrimination in their work.



Introduction to Youth Driver Education Funding Program Initiative

In this session, participants will learn about eligibility for the Youth Driver Education Funding Program and use of the youth driver education funds. Additionally, TWC will discuss the application process, how to refer youth to the program, and other resources. This introductory session is relevant to everyone who works with young people, including child welfare system administrators, foster youth liaisons, caseworkers, and staff at private agencies and nonprofits.

Jerry Milner is co-director of the Family Justice Group. He began is career as a front-line social worker in Alabama, working primarily with teenagers in foster care and in prevention services for families. His prior work includes serving as state child welfare director in Alabama. From 2017 - 2021 he led the U.S. Children's Bureau, and for most of that time was Acting Commissioner for the Administration of Children and Families.

We Are Vaxxed TX: Collaborating with Young People to Build COVID-19 Vaccine Confidence

COVID-19 is less visible in the news lately, but the virus is still having an outsized impact for many young people affected by homelessness, child welfare involvement, and other systems. Learn how TNOYS engaged young people to better understand vaccine hesitancy and barriers to access. Attendees will hear about effective communication techniques that both young people and providers can use to talk about sensitive topics, as well as youth-friendly resources to build vaccine confidence and health equity.



Texas Emerging Leaders Board: Opportunity Youth Landscape in Texas

Members of TNOYS' newest youth engagement program, the Texas Emerging Leaders Board (TELB), will come together in this panel discussion to about the unique intersection of Opportunity Youth status and systems-involvement. They will reflect on their experiences on their lived systems experiences, their time in the TELB, and the need for providers to center youth voice in conversations surrounding Opportunity Youth, 16-24 year olds who are disconnected from work and school.



Ensuring All Students Experiencing Housing Instabilities Connect

This session will explore liaisons' identification and case management styles, and assess liaison or LEA policies that may create barriers for students seeking the resources for which they are eligible. Participants will review the McKinney- Vento Liaison responsibilities, discuss best practices from McKinney-Vento Liaisons and programs across the region, and work through scenarios and tools that Region 13 staff have encountered in their work to support all students experiencing homelessness.



Talk Saves Lives: A Practicum on Suicide Prevention

Ned Strauss, American Foundation for Suicide Prevention

This session will discuss effective methods to bring hope to those affected by suicide. Participants will learn the scope and causes of clinical depression, understand the progression of suicidal thoughts from inception to tipping point, learn the warning signs and risk factors associated with depression and suicide, and learn strategies to save the life of someone who may be at risk for depression and/or suicide.

Systems lived expertise includes youth homelessness, child welfare, juvenile justice, healthcare access, and more.



Credible Messengers: Connecting with Youth Through Transformative Mentoring Charles Rotramel and Carlos Hernandez, Houston re:Vision

The credible messenger movement is an innovative approach to restorative justice that leverages the unique relationships that adults with lived experience of the justice system form with justice-involved youth. Credible messengers connect with and motivate the most vulnerable young people to challenge and transform destructive thinking, attitudes, and actions, ultimately helping to modify behavior and strengthen disadvantaged communities. In this session, participants will receive an overview of the credible messenger movement and strategies to implement a credible messenger program.



Making Measurement Meaningful: A Participatory and Equity-Focused Approach to Outcome Measurement

More often than not, the desired outcomes of social service organizations are developed with little input from those receiving or providing services. This presentation will demonstrate how a large non-profit in Austin, Texas, aligned its approach to outcome measurement with the perspectives of service recipients and program staff. Presenters will discuss a variety of methodological approaches and strategies to better center the perspectives of clients, particularly clients of color.

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




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
