Not only were the youth pretty good in the kitchen, it provided an opportunity for them to be creative and share stories from their childhood. These experiences paved the way for the Fresh Chefs Society.

In Austin, Shaleiah was fortunate enough to befriend someone who had a desire to get young people more involved with giving back to the community, so together they started Fresh Chefs Society. Fresh Chefs Society aims to create a medium for foster care youth to learn the art of cooking from community chefs and culinary experts. One of Fresh Chefs main goals is to engage the community - all of us have a role in ensuring youth who are aging out of the oster care system are given the best possible opportunity to succeed. Cooking and eating right is an important aspect of independent living, Fresh Chefs Society believes that this is often overlooked.

Why do you give back to the community?

I was appointed a Guardian Ad Litem named Barbara when I was in foster care. For so long, she was the only constant in my life – showed up when she said she would, always remained positive and offered me another take on life – one that was stable and relatively turmoil free. It was through the time spent with her and her family that I saw I could have another life no matter what I was going through at that time. This taught me two very important things: 1. You never know the impact you are making on someone when you take the time to give back or help, and 2. It takes only one stable individual in a young person's life to make all the difference.

As soon as I was old enough and had a vehicle, I trained to become a Guardian Ad Litem and have been one ever since. 'I give back because there is beauty and opportunity through struggle. I now see that all the pain and hardship I went through in foster care can be used in a powerful way to inform my life's work and other youth that the life they are born into, doesn't have to be theirs, if they don't want it to be. " Shaleiah Fox enjoys being an advocate for all people, but finds herself most effective when working with women and youth in foster care. "I love working with youth transitioning out of care. TEMPORARY HOUSING ASSISTANCE BETWEEN ACADEMIC TERMS

(EFFECTIVE 9/1/2011) - Texas' institutes of higher education are required to assist full-time students formerly in DFPS conservatorship or who have been legally emancipated in locating temporary housing between

academic terms (Christmas and summer holiday breaks). Students must be a full-time student in the semester preceding the housing need; be registered or started the enrollment actions as a full-time student for the next semester period following the housing accommodation; and lack other reasonable temporary housing alternatives. Students must request the housing assistance and are encouraged to inquire at financial aid offices, student affairs offices, admissions offices, or housing/residence life/residential living offices or ask a Student Ombudsperson.

BACTERIAL MENINGITIS VACCINE FOR STUDENTS ENTERING POST SECONDARY EDUCATION

(EFFECTIVE 1/2/2012) - Students under age 30 entering a Texas institution of higher education must be vaccinated for bacterial meningitis. For DFPS foster youth, payments for doctor's visits and vaccination costs are covered by Texas Medicaid (STAR Health or Traditional); Medicaid for Transitioning Foster Care Youth (MTFCY); or the Former Foster Care Youth in Higher Education (FFCHE) program. Young adults are encouraged to check college admissions policies for more information about the vaccination requirement.

Trial Independence Period (TI): (Effective 9/19/11) A young adult in DFPS conservatorship who turns 18 as well as a young adult enrolled in the Extended Foster Care Program may leave foster care for a "trial independence" period of 6 months (or up to 12 months with a court order). During the TI peri-od, the young adult may be living independently and receiving other transitional living benefits such as PAL, ETV, and Transitional Medicaid. A young adult that elects to return to Extended Foster Care during the TI period may do so without losing Title IV-E eligibility.

Extended Court Jurisdiction: Young adults that leave foster care at age 18 for a TI period will have court jurisdiction extended for 6 months. Additionally court jurisdiction may be extended for a 12 month TI period if ordered by the court. If a young adult is in Extended Foster Care, court jurisdiction will continue during this period but will not exceed he month of their 21st birthday.

Returing to Extended Foster Care: Young adults who aged out of DFPS foster care may return to paricipate in the Extended Foster Care Program until the age of 21 if the required stipulations are met:

• Understand that court jurisdiction will be extended, if the court permits

• Sign or re-sign a Voluntary Extended Foster Care agreement;

•Agree to one of the extended foster care activiies with in 30 days of being placed in extended foster care

• Is offered an available placement.

PAL staff pre-screen these young adults who want to return to Extended Foster Care.

Extended Forster Care Program: With the implementation of the federal Fostering Connections Act (Title IV-E of the Social Security Act) on 10-1-2010, a young adul who ages out of foster care at age 18 will continue to be eligible for Extended Foster Care provided the young adult signs a voluntary extended foster care agreement prior to or within 30 days of the young adult's 18th birthday. The young adult must be:

• 18 or up to 22 year olds, and:

•regularly attending high school or enrolled in a program leading toward a high school diploma or school equivalence certificate (GED); or is 18 to 21 years old and;

•regularly attending an institution of higher education or a post secondary vocational or technical program (minimum six hours per semester);or actively participating in a program or activity that promotes, or removes barriers to, employment; • employed for at least 80 hours per month; or • incapable of doing any of the above due to a documented medical condition.
